HUMANISTS WELCOME INCLUSION IN COUNCIL OF EUROPE "HIGH LEVEL" DIALOGUE WITH RELIGIONS

The European Humanist Federation (EHF) warmly welcomes the recommendation [note 1] by the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe that the 47 member states set up a "platform for dialogue" between high-level representatives of Europe's main religions and of humanist and non-religious organisations.

Commenting today, David Pollock, President of the EHF, said: "The EHF is ready to take part in a dialogue. We need to emphasise what all our traditions have in common and explore how best people of all beliefs, religious and non-religious, can live together in democratic societies. Although religion is now of little importance to the self-identity of most people in Europe [note 2], it remains significant for many and retains considerable institutional power that needs to be harnessed for social cohesion and mutual respect. A dialogue under the auspices of the Council of Europe could contribute helpfully to the debate about the place of religion in free, democratic societies that is taking place across Europe.

"The EHF is well placed to contribute to this dialogue. We took part in the deliberations of the Committee on Culture, Science and Education which produced the report agreed on Tuesday [note 3]. We have also taken a constructive part in discussions on religious education sponsored by the Council of Europe [note 4] and in conferences on intercultural dialogue sponsored by the Council, the EU and the UN Alliance of Civilisations [note 5]."

- 1. The recommendation, adopted by 95 votes to 4, includes:
 - 17. The Assembly recommends that the Committee of Ministers:
 - 17.1. promote a genuine partnership for democracy and human rights between the Council of Europe, the religious institutions and humanist and non-religious organisations, seeking to encourage the active involvement of all stakeholders in action to promote the fundamental values of the Organisation;
 - 17.2. establish, to this end, a place for dialogue, a workspace between the Council of Europe and high-level representatives of religions and of non-denominational organisations [in the French version, "organisations non confessionnelles"] in order to place existing

relations on a stable and formally recognised platform . . .
